The Shire of Toodyay invites Contractors to submit an expression of interest for the proposed Sport and Recreation Precinct project. The EOI will be assessed against selection criteria and a pre-qualified tender list created. Contractors <u>must have</u> aquatic experience and project capability in excess of \$10M+GST to be considered.

The tender will be conducted in April 2019. All EOI documents are available from the Shire of Toodyay Tenderlink portal.

#### PROPOSED APPLICATION FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

PROPOSED REACTIVATION OF EXTRACTIVE INDUSTRIES – STONE, LOT 6 LOVERS LANE, TOODYAY

The Shire of Toodyay has received an application from RURAL STONE PTY LTD to reactivate an extractive industry at Lot 6 Lovers Lane in Toodyay.

The applicant is seeking approval to remove stone for building and construction purposes from three small existing pit totalling 2.4 hectares. In addition there will be existing sorting and piles of resource with no excavation on 2.7 hectares of land. The proposal is for the extraction of 500 tonnes of Toodyay stone and up to 2,000 tonnes of crushed schist per year.

The pit operation will be intermittent and restricted to campaigns. Quarrying will be around 30 days per year and sorting and packing an additional 30 - 60 days per year.

Truck movements will be variable but a maximum of 1 - 2 trailer loads per week. There will be no increase in truck movements from the earlier operation of these pits. Access will be by via Lovers Lane and Toodyay Road.

No clearing is required to extract the next ten years' resource. Potential for minor clearing for years 10 - 20 through a Clearing Permit Application and approval.

Hours of operation will be 7:00am – 5:00pm Monday to Saturday, excluding public holidays. The anticipated duration of the extraction program is approximately 20 years.

Your written submissions on the proposed extractive industry are encouraged, they must be addressed to the CEO and received by the Shire prior to 4.00pm **Wednesday**, **3 April 2019**.

#### **RANGERS: Corellas**

The Shire has received a number of complaints regarding the Corella population in Toodyay. These birds are described as a 'managed fauna' species by the Department of Biodiversity and Conservation and have been creating a large amount of noise and significant damage to both public and private infrastructure. They also pose a risk to vegetation and for long term damage to trees, particularly those trees that are potential nest sites for other bird species, including the threatened black cockatoo species, not to mention being a general nuisance in agricultural areas.

The Shire is working towards both short term and long term solutions for the management of these birds.



#### RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

The Shire of Toodyay entered the Restricted Burning Period on 9 March 2019. During the Restricted Burning Period a valid permit is required for any burning activity. Permits allow a managed approach to burning which cannot realistically be deferred to other times of the year. As such, the Shire will give priority to permit requests for agricultural purposes relating to burning of stubble or chaff for crop preparation purposes during the current Restricted Burning Period. ## Delivering safer communities in Pearce

The Federal Member for Pearce, Hon. Christian Porter, has announced the Liberal Government will provide over \$300,000 in funding to two successful local organisations in Pearce for the installation of CCTV and security infrastructure being the Shire of Toodyay and the Swan Velley Sporting Club.

The Shire of Toodyay will receive \$300,000 under Round 3 of the Liberal Government's \$30 million Safer Communities Fund. Shire Staff once again put in the hard yards to facilitate this grant funding and together with Telstra. The contracts have been signed and the project will commence in the near future with the replacement of all current CCTV cameras throughout Toodyay (with the exception of the licence place recognition cameras) plus an additional 3 new poles and cameras. The system will be run on a new dedicated server with the Police Station receiving a new monitor.

Mr Porter said that all Australians have a right to feel safe and secure within their communities.

"The best way to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour is to prevent it from happening, which is why these projects are so critical".


The DVDs are available from the Toodyay Library for viewing.

## **Duidgee Park Toilets to receive facelift!**

Plans have now been drawn up for the refurbishment and extension of the Duidgee Park Toilet block. Funding for this project is included in the Shire's budget with the possibility of the project also benefiting from some external funding.

The existing building will be retained and upgraded with all new fixtures and fittings with an addition of an Accessible/Family room being added which will comply with Australian Standards 1428.1.

It is hoped that work will commence soon after Anzac Day (25 April 2019) and should take around 8 weeks to complete - weather permitting.

### President's Pen

The Toodyay night markets were a huge success with the balmy weather conditions and were enjoyed many people. After being attracted and absorbed by the market stalls, people were then able to take advantage of dining out at the local eating establishments. All venues reported large crowds with a win win for all concerned.

Toodyay Road has received an injection of a further two million dollars towards the upgrade which is already in progress. This windfall was

surplus to a road project in the north west of the state and will enable an extension of works from the railway bridge over Harper Brook to Coorinja Winery. Further works will not be known until the State Budget is presented in late May 2019. The funds allocated in the budget will identify which of the six sections identified in the initial project will be completed as funds become available to Main Roads.

The bridge on Bindi Bindi Road requires remedial work to return the bridge to a safe standard. The bridge requires struts under it to support beams which are in a poor state of repair, so when funds become available the bridge will be replaced. In the meantime, the left hand section of the bridge heading north is unsafe and will remain cordoned off. The lights are in operation to allow safe vehicle traffic over the bridge.

Councillors conducted the annual roads and infrastructure inspection last month in readiness for the 2019/20 annual budget deliberations to be held in June and July. The knowledge gained through this process will enable Councillors to make informed decisions as to what is required for the upgrade of roads and repair and maintenance of buildings within the shire.

The Ringa Bridge programme has been deferred for further investigation on costings for fencing and repairs to sections of the

Toodyay railway footbridge is still in the hands of the Public Transport Authority for a final decision on works they are required to perform, to return the bridge to a safe standard, before handing the bridge to the care and maintenance of the shire. When this process is complete the public will be informed.

#### NO PLACE IN LOCAL COUNCILS FOR BULLIES. SAYS LOCAL GOVERNMENT MINISTER DAVID TEMPLEMAN

Bullying of local government councillors is unacceptable and bullies should be called out. Local Government Minister David Templeman says. Mr Templeman, part way through a review of the Local Government Act to modernise it for good governance, said "robust debate" was crucial for democracy, but it had to be respectful.

"I'm disturbed by the abuse that is occurring against elected members and CEOs and other staff of councils," he said.

increased with the rise of social media. It had the potential to hinder the ability of a council to function, he said, and it was the sort of behaviour that could not be fixed with legislation.

He called out the "mob mentality" that had resulted in some members of the community, most recently in Subiaco, expressing intense discomfort that if they speak up in favour of a new planning contacted and targeted on social media by people opposed.

"It is really not only unnecessary, it is un-Australian," Mr Templeman their hands up".

"But at the end of the journey there are elected people who are responsible for making decisions. People should be able to put their point of view in a respectful manner and be heard. That's their right.

"I think the mob mentality, if there is a pervading mob mentality, I think it's unhealthy."

Mr Templeman said the review of the Local Government Act was even more crucial in this context.

The litmus test for a functioning council, from a State Government point of view, was whether it was still making decisions. The review will improve councillor training even for prospective councillors so Mr Templeman said the level and intensity of vitriol appeared to have they better understand some challenges of the role and to improve governance.

Feedback received in the review indicated a degree of concern about blurring roles between chief executives and elected members but few concerns about whether non-compulsory voting at local government elections was resulting in skewed councils. Mr Templeman said decision-making for a community was not just about one or two scheme or the development of an old markets site, that they will be issues. #### New Museum Exhibition at the Newcastle Gaol

Our new exhibition at the Gaol is titled Taking up the Trail - Botanical Journeys from Toodyay to Mt Lesueur. The exhibition is exploring the stories of botanical iourneys over time to Toodyay. New Norcia and on to Mt Leseuer near Jurien Bay. Themes include Deep Time (the Noongar perspective), European Discovery and 20th Century and Beyond. Significant artefacts from the Benedictine Community of New Norcia collections have been borrowed for the exhibition which has now been extended to

the end of the year.

On show (reproduced for the first time on a large screen) are coloured slides from the personal collection of noted West Australian botanist, Charles Austin Gardner. These slides were included in the beguest made to the Benedictine Community of New Norcia after Gardner's death in 1970. They have largely been hidden since then. Many wildflower images are from the 1950s and 1960s and their clarity is extraordinary. The exhibition launch was held on Saturday, 16





## **New Memory Café to open in Toodyay**

A new Memory Café will be launched at Toodyay's well-known Cola Café and Museum, less than six months after Toodyay commenced the process to become a dementia friendly town through the Dementia Friendly Communities project.

Alzheimer's WA CEO Rhonda Parker said the Toodyay Memory Café was initiated by dementia advocate Angi McCluskey and supported by WA Country Health Service and the Toodyay Shire.

"We are thrilled the Cola Café and Museum is to become WA's next Memory Café," Ms Parker said.

'Memory Cafes provide an opportunity for people living with dementia to socialise, feel welcomed in a safe and inclusive environment, and make new friends.

"The objective from the start for the Dementia Friendly Communities project was to reduce the stigma attached to dementia and instead develop a community that enables and supports people living with dementia to remain active in the community rather than be confined within the four walls of their home.

"People with dementia deserve to participate in everyday life, and require support and understanding to do so."

Ms Parker said 70% of people with a diagnosis of dementia live at home in the community making it a community challenge rather than just an aged care challenge.

"It is imperative that opportunities exist for people living with dementia to have continued engagement in the local community in ordinary, everyday activities, and that they feel safe and comfortable to do so, she said.

"The Memory Cafés show how the simple, everyday pleasures of engaging with the community mean so much for all of us, and how simple it is to extend that opportunity to those living with dementia."

The Toodyay Memory Café launches on Tuesday, 9 April 2019, 10.00am - 12.00pm at The Cola Café and Museum, 128 Stirling Terrace, Toodyay WA 6566. Following the launch, the Memory Café will run on the second Tuesday of each month at 10.00am.
